From the Pastor:

"Without solitude it is virtually impossible to live a spiritual life. Solitude begins with a time and place for God, and for him alone. If we really believe not only that God exists but also that he is actively present in our lives – healing, teaching, and guiding – we need to set aside a time and space to give him our undivided attention." Henri Nowen

I am writing this just a few days before beginning the first week of my two-week vacation, which will be followed by a three month clergy renewal leave. I have been trying to make sure that all of the administrative details are taken care of, that my desk is clear enough for the sabbatical interim, Don Rasmussen, to use, and to take from my office the books I would like to read during my time away from pastoral duties.

One of the books that I will be reading for the third time is the <u>Celebration of Discipline: The Path</u> to <u>Spiritual Growth</u>, by Richard J. Foster. It was first published in 1978, revised and expanded in 1988, and a 20th anniversary edition published in 1998. This "modern" guidebook on Christian spirituality has sold well over a million copies to date. Foster is a Christian Theologian and Author in the Quaker tradition.

Foster discusses twelve classic spiritual disciplines as "a door to liberation." In the opening chapter, he says: "The purpose of the Disciplines is liberation from the stifling slavery to self-interest and fear. When the inner spirit is liberated from all that weighs it down, it can hardly be described as dull drudgery. Singing, dancing, even shouting characterize the Discipline of the spiritual life."

Foster places the Disciplines in three categories, or as he describes them, three movements of the Spirit:

The Inward Disciplines: Meditation; Prayer; Fasting; Study The Outward Discipline: Simplicity; Solitude; Submission; Service The Corporate Discipline: Confession; Worship; Guidance; Celebration.

As I read this classic once again, I plan on using a journal to make notes and record my thoughts and new insights from the book. I will also be using the study guide, which offers scriptural references, reflection questions, and suggested activities to practice the Disciplines.

I encourage you to consider reading <u>Celebration of Discipline</u>. It can be purchased on-line or at bookstores. It may not be the traditional "read at the beach" book, but it may be a blessed addition to your devotional readings. Perhaps I will lead a study based on the Disciplines, using Foster's book. I am also hoping that it will be an inspiration for a sermon series in the fall. Why not consider delving into the "ancient" disciplines of the faith in the context of our modern world?

Enjoy your summer. I'll see you in September!

FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Maintenance and repair issues continue to dominate our agenda. Following approval by the church membership at a special meeting held on May 6th, the Trustees have authorized the re-glazing as necessary, priming, and painting the exterior of twenty-four (24) windows and three (3) doors in the Sanctuary, Lower Vestry, and Church Office. The work is currently scheduled to begin during the week of June 5th, and it is expected to take two to three weeks to complete.

A report regarding the conversion of our facilities to more efficient lighting has been received from National Grid/RISE. As a result of a detailed inventory of our lighting fixtures and usage, our church building has been divided into two areas identified as "high" and "low" usage (hours per day). The high usage area includes, generally, Fellowship Hall lower level, stairwell to upper level (north), upper hallway (north), hallway at office, lower vestry (all), and exterior lights (all). The remainder of our church building was identified as low usage. The board has voted to proceed with the conversion in the high usage area. The proposed contract prepared by National Grid/RISE is being negotiated.

The existing sign board at the intersection of Putnam Pike with Church Street has been the topic of discussion at both the Board of Trustees and Executive Board meetings for a number of months. One issue raised is the lack of information provided on the sign. The Diaconate has formally requested that the Trustees consider a new or revised sign board at this location. It has been suggested that the sign could provide more information and that it might be illuminated. Several concerns including zoning issues, traffic safety, readability by moving traffic, and providing electric service to this location were raised. Board members will review the existing conditions for further discussion at our next meeting.

FROM THE BOARD OF DIACONATE
